Hurricane Harvey Inspires BSEE's Lake Jackson District Heroes

ANGLETON, Texas. – In the midst of tremendous loss and suffering in the wake of Hurricane Harvey, several Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement employees in the Lake Jackson District have joined the "Texas Navy" while other employees are providing direct aid to those in need of help. Some of these heroic BSEE employees have already suffered losses of their own, but that has not deterred them from joining with relief agencies and volunteer rescuers to provide assistance to the victims of this historic storm.

Harvey unleashed its wrath on a wide swath of Texas and Louisiana, leaving thousands stranded in flooded homes and forcing thousands more to seek shelter elsewhere. As this story plays out on national television networks, most of us watch the extent of the damage and suffering from afar. In the area south of Houston, BSEE employees are part of the story. In spite of the tremendous impact of the disaster, the work of these heroes, as well as the massive outpouring of aid and relief from all parts of the nation, is inspiring.
